
This journey is far from over. But each person we reach, each life we touch, takes us one step closer to a cancer-free India. Thank you for walking with us.



Pediatric Cancer Program

Cancer affects people of all ages, including children. While pediatric cancer is uncommon, it is treatable with timely detection and appropriate care.

Cancer remains a leading cause of death among children and adolescents. In high-income countries, more than 80% of children with cancer receive effective treatment, whereas in many low- and middle-income countries (LMICs), the survival rate is less than 30%. Every year, an estimated 4,00,000 children and adolescents between the ages of 0 and 19 are diagnosed with cancer. The most prevalent types include leukemia, brain tumors, lymphomas, and solid tumors such as neuroblastoma and Wilms tumor.

Since childhood cancer is generally not preventable, the most effective approach to improving outcomes is early and accurate diagnosis, followed by evidence-based treatment and personalized supportive care.

Globally, more than 3,00,000 children are diagnosed with cancer each year, with India accounting for approximately 50,000 new pediatric cancer cases annually.

Over the past two decades, India has made significant progress in pediatric cancer care. However, outcomes remain modest compared to global standards due to persistent challenges in awareness, early recognition, diagnosis, and access to treatment.

Major Challenges in Childhood Cancer Care (ICMR)

- Lack of awareness among parents and caregivers on childhood cancer in India.
- Lack of expertise in grassroot healthcare workers in recognising the symptoms of childhood cancer.

- Lack of specialized diagnostic facilities in peripheral centers with lack of knowledge of interpretation.
- Treatment denial (non-acceptance or refusal to undergo treatment) and treatment abandonment (failure to complete treatment when the disease can be effectively controlled), for which financial constraints were the most commonly cited reason.
- 1 in 10 children diagnosed with cancer in India never reach a cancer center for treatment.

Cancer Treatment Fund

The YouWeCan Cancer Treatment Fund for Paediatric Patients offers financial support for the treatment of qualified cancer patients, up to Rs. 2,00,000.00 (two lakhs) per patient. Only patients from unprivileged backgrounds who are younger than 18 are qualified to receive assistance from the fund. According to the hospital's treatment plan, all medical expenses for the shortlisted patients are covered, including (but not limited to) diagnostic testing, investigations, chemotherapy, radiation therapy, surgery, and prescription drug costs.

The partner hospital offers all medical services directly associated with the treatment. YouWeCan Foundation's role is limited to providing financial aid to support the cost of treatment.

Strict processes are in place for due diligence and screening of cases. To ensure transparency and to maintain strong financial control, funds are disbursed directly to hospitals and not to beneficiaries or their caregivers/ family.

BRIDGE FUND FOR CANCER TREATMENT To provide interim and urgent relief to fund the early stage treatment within the first 3 months of diagnosis for those patients that have applied for government funding and awaiting the approval from central &/ or state government health schemes, capped at a maximum of Rs, 50,000 per patient.

CANCER TREATMENT FUND To fund the entire cost of treatment of the patient, as per the treatment plan of the hospital, capped at a maximum amount of Rs. 2,00,000 per patient.



Scholarship for Cancer Survivors

Education plays a crucial role in shaping future employment, income, and overall integration into society. As a result, it serves as an essential indicator of long-term survivorship. However, children undergoing cancer treatment often face significant academic challenges. The effects of treatment on cognition, prolonged school absences, and falling behind in academics can impact their ability to complete their education.

Studies indicate that while 50% of children with cancer attend school within the first month of treatment, this number increases to 70% by the fourth month. However, absenteeism remains notably higher among children with brain tumors compared to those with other cancers. Irregular school attendance can persist for years after treatment, further compounding educational difficulties for survivors.

The YouWeCan Scholarship: Enabling Education for Cancer Survivors

To address these challenges, the YouWeCan Scholarship provides financial assistance to childhood cancer survivors from underprivileged backgrounds, helping them reintegrate into the formal education system after completing treatment.

- Each enrolled student receives a scholarship of up to Rs. 25,000 per year.
- The support continues annually until the student completes their education.

Founded in 2016 by Yuvraj Singh, the scholarship was initiated after he observed that many young cancer survivors, especially from low-income backgrounds, were forced to drop out of school due to financial constraints. Initially limited to school students, the program expanded in 2018 to include cancer survivors pursuing higher education.

Palak Kumari



My name is Deepak. I work as a laborer and my wife is a homemaker. We reside in Gautam Budh Nagar in Uttar Pradesh. Everything was going well until our 2 – year – old daughter Palak began suffering from fever after every 7 days. After consulting a doctor, we came to know that her immune system was very weak which was leading to frequent fevers. We changed a lot of doctors, but we did not get the proper treatment for our child. Seeing that her condition was not improving we were referred to the PGICH, Noida where we came to know that Palak is suffering from T-cell acute lymphoblastic leukemia and needed to undergo a challenging and lengthy chemotherapy process.

During our time at the hospital, we came to know from the doctor about the Yuvraj Singh Foundation, an organization which provides financial support to families that are unable to bear the burden of their child's treatment. They became our unwavering and constant support system and offered us medical assistance. Palak's treatment is still going on and she is showing remarkable strength and determination. Now under the care of PGICH, Palak's treatment is progressing well. We wish that she recovers soon, and we are able to give her the education that she deserves.

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We are profoundly grateful to Yuvraj Singh and his foundation for their assistance when no one else stepped forward to support us. As a laborer, I was struggling to manage the additional financial burden of medical expenses, and the Foundation's support played a vital role in providing us the financial support associated with Palak's treatment.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to the YouWeCan Foundation for their timely and essential support. We want to express our gratitude for their assistance not only in Palak's case but also their commendable efforts in aiding cancer patients and raising awareness about this critical issue. I pray and hope that many more families and children will find their savior in the Yuvraj Singh Foundation.

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Umam Fatima



My daughter's name is Umam Fatima, and she is 4.5 years old. We are from Bareilly, Uttar Pradesh. A few months ago, we began noticing that she had frequent, unexplained fevers that wouldn't go away. At first, we thought it was a seasonal illness, but when the fever became constant, we grew deeply concerned. We consulted a local doctor in Bareilly, and after several visits and tests, he told us that her condition needed urgent attention at a more advanced medical center. He referred us to PGICH Noida and also informed us about the Yuvraj Singh Foundation.

We immediately made the journey to Noida and admitted her to PGICH for further diagnosis and treatment. On August 3, 2023, her treatment officially began. Since then, we have been living in and out of hospitals, doing everything possible to help our daughter recover. Even now, she continues to experience persistent fevers, and her treatment is ongoing. The entire situation has been overwhelming for us as parents—emotionally, mentally, and financially.

Before Umam fell ill, we lived a modest but peaceful life. I ran a small business which was just enough to support my family. But with Umam's condition worsening and our constant need to travel between Bareilly and Noida, I was forced to put the business

on hold. Our household income came to a standstill, and managing day-to-day expenses alongside medical costs became impossible.

This is when we were introduced to the YouWeCan Foundation, and that changed everything for us. The Foundation stepped in with timely financial support, guidance, and most importantly—hope. They helped us navigate the treatment process, explained the documentation, and ensured that we could focus on our daughter's health without the fear of mounting hospital bills.

For a family struggling to meet daily needs, the cost of cancer treatment feels unimaginable. But the Foundation became a constant support system during this dark time. Their assistance meant that we didn't have to make impossible choices between treatment and survival. Their presence gave us the courage to continue fighting for our daughter.

Even at this young age, Umam is brave and full of life. Despite her illness, she tries to smile and play. On her good days, she enjoys coloring and holding her favorite soft toys. Seeing her fight through the pain with so much innocence fills us with immense pride and sorrow at the same time. No parent is ever prepared to see their child in such pain, but her strength gives us strength.

We are hopeful that with the continued care of her doctors at PGICH and the support of the YouWeCan Foundation, Umam will recover completely and return to a normal childhood.

I am Vareena, aunt to Ayesha Khatun. She is a 7-year-old battling blood cancer. Despite her illness, Ayesha is a bright and dedicated first-grader who never loses sight of her studies. Thanks to the YWC's generous scholarships for the past two years, the financial burden of education and treatment has lessened, allowing her to focus on getting better.

But Ayesha's spirit extends far beyond textbooks. She finds joy in playing and expressing herself through vibrant paintings. The Yuvraj Singh Foundation has been our pillar of strength, offering a lifeline to families like ours who struggle with the dual burden of healthcare and education costs.

Our journey hasn't been easy. Ayesha was diagnosed at a stage when we were least prepared—emotionally and financially. Her parents were devastated, unsure of how to manage the sudden medical needs while trying to maintain stability at home. Her mother had to leave her job to become Ayesha's full-time caregiver, while her father tried to manage daily expenses and rising medical bills. The diagnosis came as a storm, and we were struggling to stay afloat.

When we connected with the Yuvraj Singh Foundation, it was like finding light in a very dark place. Their team didn't just assist us with financial aid—they stood beside us, guiding us through hospital procedures, explaining paperwork, and ensuring Ayesha had access to timely treatment. Their emotional support was just as crucial. At times when our hope faltered, they reminded us that we weren't alone.

Ayesha, despite everything, continues to be a source of inspiration. She wakes up eager to attend her online classes whenever possible, and her face lights up when she draws or paints. Her doctors often remark on her resilience, and it's this resilience that gives our entire family the courage to keep going. Every small improvement in her health feels like a big victory.

We dream of the day when Ayesha can run freely, attend school in person, and enjoy a childhood without hospital visits. We are grateful for the continuous care from her medical team and for the unwavering support from the Yuvraj Singh Foundation. Their kindness has not only helped Ayesha medically and academically—it has given her the chance to dream again.



Urvashi



My name is Urvashi, and I hail from Wardha, Maharashtra. I'm 27 years old and a lymphoma survivor. Facing this diagnosis was immensely challenging for both me and my family. Fortunately, I received treatment at Tata Memorial Hospital, where doctors and social workers introduced me to the "YouWeCan" Foundation and their scholarship program.

When I was diagnosed, I had just begun envisioning a stable future for myself and my loved ones. The news came as a sudden blow—everything changed overnight. Hospital visits became frequent, and the uncertainty of recovery hovered over us constantly. My parents were distressed, not just by my illness, but also by the financial strain it brought. As a middle-class family, we had limited savings, and my treatment expenses started depleting them rapidly.

In those vulnerable moments, being introduced to the YWC scholarship program felt like a ray of hope. It wasn't just financial assistance—it symbolized a belief in my potential and gave me the strength to continue my academic and professional journey without interruption. I used that time not

only to focus on recovery but also to invest in my career aspirations. Even during my weakest days, I would dream of a life beyond cancer—a life where I could stand on my own feet, regain my confidence, and contribute meaningfully to society.

For the past two years, I've been a proud recipient of this scholarship, awarded in 2022 and 2023. My health has improved significantly, and I'm currently employed as an HR professional in Pune, fulfilling my dream of working in a reputed company within this field. It hasn't been easy—there were days filled with fatigue, emotional setbacks, and self-doubt. But I kept moving forward, driven by the desire to reclaim my independence.

The scholarship allowed me to complete my education without being a burden on my family. It helped bridge the gap between survival and stability, between pain and purpose. Today, I manage responsibilities at work, interact with teams, and live a life I once feared I might lose forever.

Words cannot express my gratitude to the "You We Can" Foundation and Mr. Yuvraj Singh for their invaluable support during my difficult time. To all fellow survivors, I want to emphasize that with unwavering mental strength and the help of organizations like YWC, we can conquer even the most daunting challenges, like cancer.

Breast Cancer Program

In India,

Every 4 minutes, a woman in India is diagnosed with Breast Cancer.

Every 8 minutes, a woman succumbs to the disease.

India ranks #1 globally in new Breast Cancer cases and female mortality due to the disease. 70% of patients are diagnosed at advanced stages (Stage 3 or 4), significantly increasing mortality rates. The five-year survival rate decreases 2.7 times when breast cancer is detected at Stage IV compared to Stage I. Treating late-stage cancers costs 1.5 to 2 times more than early-stage treatment.

People diagnosed at an early stage are 4.4 times more likely to survive for five years than those with advanced-stage cancer. Additionally, individuals

above 65 years old have a 16% lower survival chance compared to those aged 15–39 years.

Early detection saves lives. Timely intervention reduces mortality and financial burden.

















Breast Cancer Stats in India

Late-stage breast cancer diagnosis is primarily driven by two key factors: the absence of well-structured screening programs and low participation rates, even where such programs exist. Several barriers contribute to this, including a lack of awareness, limited access to quality healthcare, and socio-cultural influences. For a screening program to be effective, it must achieve high coverage and participation, along with a strong referral system for timely diagnosis and treatment.



Research indicates that Indian women diagnosed with breast cancer experience a significant loss of healthy years of life. The incidence of breast cancer is rising, particularly among women aged 25 to 59, largely due to evolving risk factors across generations. Early detection—whether through symptom recognition or routine screening—can substantially reduce mortality from advanced-stage disease. Increasing breast cancer awareness in India can play a crucial role in early diagnosis.

While breast cancer survival rates in India have improved, they still lag behind those of high-income countries. To bridge this gap, a comprehensive national cancer control strategy is essential. This should include widespread awareness campaigns, accessible and affordable screening programs, equitable treatment options, and robust support systems for both survivors and those in palliative care.

Three important components of the YSF approach:

EDUCATE: Awareness and behavior change communication are the first steps of evaluation and investigation of the disease in women as it helps provide a baseline assessment of the epidemiological spread of the disease and strategies to educate the population around it. The style of education is particularly designed to suit the community's needs. Prior knowledge about the disease, its risk factors, self-breast examination, and the importance of screening are all essential for tackling this issue. The goal of this step is to ensure breast health knowledge and practices become a part of the lifestyle of every woman and thus promote good health.

DETECT: Every woman should undergo breast screening once a year as common practice. To make this a routine activity, it is important that the screening is made available in a way that is acceptable, accessible, and affordable to the beneficiary. Soon after a woman is informed and educated about the program, they are encouraged to get themselves screened and be informed about their status and offered appropriate counseling and support. Studies worldwide have shown that screening for breast cancer has resulted in lowering the mortality rate in a woman and thereby increasing their survival rate to a large extent.

EMPOWER: To provide end-to-end support in our fight against breast cancer, it is necessary to offer last-mile delivery by linking the beneficiaries to treatment services, counsel them, ensure follow-up and keep all channels of feedback open to strengthen the model and adapt to the needs of its beneficiaries. In a difficult situation, it is our responsibility to empower women to destigmatize breast health and put their health needs first and live a healthy and dignified life.

By making new-age AI-powered theramlytix technology available and affordable, we are making breast cancer screening a painless, non-invasive, and radiation-free experience for the women in the country who still find talking about their breast health a major taboo.

To address the taboo surrounding breast health, education and awareness are crucial. By educating women about the importance of conducting self-breast exams and undergoing screenings, we can motivate them to prioritize their health. This education is not just about the physical act of checking for lumps or abnormalities, but also about understanding the social factors that may prevent women from taking care of their health.

When women are more informed about their health, they are more likely to seek out health services that they trust and that respect their privacy. This can lead to higher rates of screening, which in turn allows for better risk assessment, early detection of breast cancer, and the generation of evidence for future research.

Finally, it's important to empower communities to support women in accessing treatment services. This includes providing follow-up care and counseling to ensure that women are supported throughout their journey to better breast health. By taking these steps, we can work towards breaking the taboo around breast health and improving outcomes for women everywhere.

Objectives of the Program

We will conduct breast cancer screening of all age eligible women, ensuring the following objectives are met:

- Create awareness on the risks of breast cancer as well as promote self-breast examination.
- · Ensure early detection of breast cancer and timely treatment.
- Provide innovative health intervention in the Indian context.
- Enable strong partnerships with government and private stakeholders to strengthen the National Cancer Control Programme in India.

We value female lives and aim to reach out to every eligible female in the country and change how we tackle the big C that is Cancer today.

Case Studies

Tasneem and Shaheen, Agrasar



A breast cancer screening camp was organized to raise awareness and provide early detection opportunities for the women of Agrasar, is an NGO. During this camp, we encountered two women who had brought their children to an anganwadi school and seemed hesitant to participate in the screening. The women were friends and neighbors in their close-knit community. They were reluctant to go for screening. Intrigued by their hesitation, the on-ground YWC team approached them to understand their concerns. Upon questioning, they revealed that they were afraid to go for screening because they feared being late in returning home. Their primary concern was that their husbands would scold and possibly resort to physical violence if they delayed returning back.

Delving deeper into their apprehensions, we discovered the prevailing social dynamics and gender roles in their community. Both women felt compelled to prioritize their household duties over their own health needs due to the fear of repercussions from their husbands.

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To address their concerns, we took the opportunity to educate them about the importance of early detection in breast cancer and how it could ultimately contribute to their overall health and well-being. We emphasized that taking a few hours for screening could potentially save their lives.

After a thoughtful discussion, they decided to go for the screening. The screening process was efficient, and they were able to return home without significant delays. It is important to acknowledge how counseling is crucial in such environments, to break the shells under which many women choose to stay for a variety of reasons. What seemed like a conversation most people would avoid, in cases where women do not consent for a preventive health measure, it is important to seek their informed consent instead of just a plain yes or a no. The women exited the screening room smiling ear to ear and leaving the premises frolicking and jumping with joy. We had never witnessed two women look so happy after a test.

This case study highlights the importance of understanding the socio-cultural context when engaging in health promotion initiatives. By addressing the specific concerns of these women, the breast cancer screening camp not only contributed to early detection but also empowered these women to prioritize their health despite the challenges they faced within their households.

In conclusion, while progress has been made towards gender equality in India, challenges persist for women, particularly in conservative communities where patriarchal norms still hold sway. The requirement for women to seek permission from their husbands for basic activities such as health checkups underscores the need for continued efforts to challenge and dismantle deep rooted gender inequalities and empower women to exercise their rights and autonomy fully.

Radha, Banaras



During a breast cancer screening camp organized in Banaras, a woman caught our attention. She appeared distressed, tears welling in her eyes. Upon talking to her, she confided in us about her worries. She expressed concerns about symptoms she was experiencing that could indicate cervical cancer or a urinary tract infection (UTI). Despite her fears, she felt powerless to seek medical attention due to her husband's disapproval. We had to counsel her and make her promise us that she was gonna see a doctor as soon as possible for her symptoms, even if it meant to lie and seek the support of a friend to accompany her to the hospital.

BENEFICIARY

Her situation underscored the multifaceted challenges faced by women in rural India concerning healthcare access. Firstly, there was the barrier of fear and lack of awareness regarding women's health issues. Secondly, socioeconomic factors played a pivotal role. Her husband's reluctance to let her seek medical help stemmed from the family's dependency on her daily wages for sustenance. Any time spent away from work was perceived as a threat to their financial stability.

Radha's case serves as a reminder of the urgent need for targeted interventions to address the intersecting challenges of health awareness, socioeconomic constraints, and gender dynamics in rural healthcare settings.

Meeting this woman at the breast cancer screening camp in Banaras shows how various factors affect women's access to healthcare in rural India. To help women like her, we need solutions that tackle medical, financial, and cultural obstacles. Her story reminds us of the importance of community-driven actions and advocacy for women's health rights.

SWASTH MAHILA SWASTH GOA



In collaboration with the SBI Foundation and the Government of Goa, we embarked on a groundbreaking project aimed at screening 110,000 women in the state for breast cancer, the most prevalent form of cancer among Indian women. This initiative, launched on October 26, 2021, at the Goa Medical College, marked a significant milestone in our commitment to women's health.

Spearheaded by Shri Vishwajit P. Rane, Minister of Health, Woman & Child Development, Skill Development & Entrepreneurship, and Industries, Trade & Commerce, Government of Goa, alongside key dignitaries including Smt. Shabnam Singh, Chairperson of YouWeCan Foundation, and Smt. Manjula Kalyanasundaram, Former Managing Director of SBI Foundation, Shri Sanjay Prakash, Managing Director of SBI Foundation, the initiative symbolizes unified effort to combat breast cancer in the region.

Since its inception, the Swasth Mahila Swasth Goa initiative, led by YouWeCan, has been dedicated to screening 110,000 women across the state to enhance early detection and treatment of breast abnormalities. With over 105,000 screenings conducted to date, our project has made significant strides towards achieving its goal.

Through meticulous screening efforts, our team has identified 2,111 women as suspects, necessitating further investigation into potential breast tissue abnormalities. While this revelation underscores the importance of early detection, it also highlights the necessity of proactive healthcare initiatives in combating breast cancer.

Among the suspects, 55 confirmed cases of breast cancer have been diagnosed, emphasizing the critical need for timely intervention. Despite the challenges encountered, our initiative remains a beacon of hope, with 52 women currently undergoing treatment for breast cancer. This underscores the resilience and determination of the individuals involved and underscores the power of community support in overcoming adversity. As the Swasth Mahila Swasth Goa initiative draws to a close in March 2024, its impact will endure, emphasizing the significance of early intervention and collaborative efforts in safeguarding the well-being of women across the region.











Oral Cancer Initiative

A Comprehensive Approach

Oral cancer, commonly referred to as mouth cancer, manifests as a malignancy affecting the lining of the lips, mouth, or upper throat. Its initial presentation often includes painless white patches, which subsequently evolve into red patches, ulcers, and progressive thickening. Notably, on the lips, it may manifest as a stubborn, crusting ulcer that resists healing and gradually enlarges. Additional symptoms may encompass difficulties or discomfort during swallowing, the appearance of new lumps or nodules in the neck, oral swelling, or a sensation of numbness in the mouth or lips.

Several factors elevate the risk of developing oral cancer, including tobacco and alcohol usage. Those who concurrently use both substances face a notably heightened risk, approximately 15 times greater than non-users. Additionally, other risk factors include HPV infection, paan chewing habits, and sun exposure, particularly affecting the lower

lip. It is vital to recognize that oral cancer constitutes a subset of head and neck cancers, with diagnosis typically established through biopsy, followed by comprehensive investigation utilizing modalities such as CT scan, MRI, PET scan, and clinical examination to assess potential metastasis.

Preventative measures against oral cancer encompass avoidance of tobacco products, moderation of alcohol consumption, sun protection for the lower lip, HPV vaccination, and abstention from paan consumption. Treatment modalities for oral cancer vary and may involve a combination of surgical intervention (for tumor and regional lymph node removal), radiation therapy, chemotherapy, or targeted therapy. The selection of treatment strategies is contingent upon factors such as tumor size, location, metastasis, and the overall health status of the individual.




Problem Statement

Oral cancer remains a major public health crisis in India, with over 75,000 new cases reported annually, ranking it among the top three cancers in the country. Over 50% of oral cancer patients succumb to the disease, primarily due to late detection. Alarmingly, India accounts for one-third of global oral cancer cases, underscoring the urgent need for action.


- Oral cancer makes up nearly 30% of all cancer diagnoses in India.
- Tobacco use affects 35 crore Indians (~30% of the population), significantly contributing to cancer risk.
- Tobacco-related illnesses claim ~1 million lives in India annually.

YWC x MSD Richard T. Clark Fellowship:

A Unified Approach to Oral Cancer

The YouWeCan Foundation, in collaboration with the MSD Richard T. Clark Fellowship for Global Health, undertook a significant step forward in designing a holistic and community-centered Oral, Head, and Neck Cancer (OHNC) program. This partnership represents a powerful convergence of corporate expertise and grassroots public health action, aimed at addressing one of India's most pressing health challenges: oral cancer among low socio-economic communities.

About the MSD Fellowship

The MSD Fellowship is a 10-week corporate pro bono initiative that deploys cross-functional teams of high-performing MSD employees from across the globe to work closely with NGOs like YouWeCan. These fellows contribute their technical, strategic, and operational skills to strengthen the capacity of the organizations and amplify their impact in public health.

For the OHNC program, MSD Fellows worked closely with YouWeCan to design a robust and scalable framework for oral cancer awareness, screening, and early detection, specifically targeting vulnerable populations in India.

Program Design and Key Components

The OHNC Program was developed with two clear goals:

- Detect oral cancer and pre-cancerous lesions early in marginalized populations.
- Promote awareness and behavioral change through anti-tobacco education and community empowerment.

Core Activities and Deliverables

Community Awareness Sessions

Tailored, one-on-one awareness sessions were conducted across six villages with youth and adults, focusing on the dangers of tobacco use and the importance of early detection.

Behavioral and Demographic Survey

200 individuals were surveyed—70% male and 30% female, spanning children to adults. Alarmingly, 90% of participants were illiterate and 30% were active tobacco users, with many initiating tobacco use during adolescence.

Field Visits and Ground Assessment

Communities such as Sikanderpur, Wazirabad, and Kanhai in Gurugram revealed stark health disparities among migrant populations. Preventive care awareness was minimal, and economic barriers pushed people to delay or avoid care altogether.

Health Infrastructure Evaluation

Hospitals and PHCs were evaluated to identify critical gaps in infrastructure, equipment, and manpower for oral cancer screening and treatment.







Program Innovations and Outcomes

Technology Integration

The program proposed the adoption of Al-powered imaging devices for non-invasive, real-time screening of oral lesions. Its portability and ease-of-use by trained health workers make it ideal for remote and underserved areas.

Community Empowerment

The program emphasized participatory education, peer-to-peer learning, and engagement with community leaders, enabling long-term behavioral change and stronger local advocacy.

Healthcare Worker Training

Training modules were developed for general practitioners, dentists, and paramedics to improve their capacity to conduct screenings and refer cases effectively.

Partnerships and Engagement of Local Governance

The program incorporated the Local Governance system by engaging Sarpanches, ward officers, and other local leaders to help organize awareness drives, provide logistical support, and ensure participation in screening camps.

Key Insights and Lessons Learned

Tailored Outreach Matters

Programs must be culturally, linguistically, and contextually aligned to resonate with low-income communities.

Technology is a Catalyst

Tools like OralScan, Velscope etc can revolutionize early detection by bringing high-tech diagnostics to the grassroots.

Community Leaders are Influencers

Involving village heads significantly boosts reach and trust within target communities.

· Behavior Change Takes Time

Media campaigns, sustained messaging, and interpersonal engagement are key to motivating people to quit tobacco.

Sustainability through Collaboration

Partnering with local health systems ensures continuity and scale of awareness and screening efforts.

The YouWeCan-MSD collaboration laid the foundation for a scalable, sustainable oral cancer program focused on prevention, early detection, and community empowerment. With plans to expand outreach, deepen village-level engagement, and enhance access to affordable screening, this program aspires to reduce the burden of oral cancer across India's most underserved communities.

We initiate awareness and behavior change to combat oral cancer, providing vital knowledge and self-examination techniques. Tailored education empowers communities to embrace improved oral health practices, motivating them to seek screening. Beneficiaries are informed about government healthcare schemes, ensuring access to free cancer treatment at district hospitals and medical colleges under the NPCDCS program.

DETECT

Regular dental screening should be a yearly habit for adults, prioritizing accessible and safe oral cancer screening. After educating beneficiaries, we encourage them to undergo screening for their oral health status. Suspected cases will be referred to Government District Hospitals and Medical Colleges for further evaluation and counseling, with treatment discussions held upon positive diagnosis.





EMPOWER

To ensure comprehensive support in our fight against oral cancer, we'll ensure all positive cases are linked to appropriate treatment. This includes offering emotional counseling for patients to cope with their diagnosis and lifestyle changes. Additionally, timely follow-ups will be provided to monitor treatment progress and ensure positive health outcomes.

Project Implementation Plan: A brief Summary

In pursuit of our objective to reduce the incidence and impact of oral cancer in the country, the Yuvraj Singh Foundation is set to implement a comprehensive plan. This initiative focuses on awareness campaigns, preventive screenings, and community engagement to address the growing challenge of oral cancer.

Our approach begins with the design and development of tailored awareness materials, including pamphlets and digital content, emphasizing the hazards of tobacco use and educating on oral cancer symptoms. Simultaneously, we are crafting a culturally sensitive curriculum for awareness sessions, ensuring that information reaches diverse segments of the population.

To amplify our impact, we will launch targeted media campaigns across all social media platforms. Community workshops will be organized in schools, colleges, and community centers, providing an interactive platform to disseminate crucial information and address questions.

At the heart of our initiative is the organization of strategic screening camps at accessible locations. Our implementation team, comprising expert dental professionals, will conduct screenings adhering to the highest standards. Our goal is to provide free oral cancer awareness and screening to address the growing burden of oral cancer in India.

Integral to our strategy is the training of healthcare professionals on oral cancer awareness and counseling. Additionally, community health workers will be trained as project ambassadors, facilitating effective communication between healthcare providers and local residents.

To measure the impact of our initiative, we will implement a robust system for data collection and analysis, focusing on oral cancer prevalence and screening outcomes. Regular evaluations will be conducted to assess effectiveness against predefined metrics, allowing us to refine strategies and improve outcomes continually.

For individuals identified with potential risks during screenings, we are establishing a comprehensive follow-up system. Collaborating with local healthcare providers, we aim to ensure seamless access to further diagnostics and treatment services.

This Project Implementation Plan is our commitment to making a meaningful impact on the burden of oral cancer in the country. Through fostering awareness, prevention, and early detection, we aspire to improve public health outcomes and contribute to the well-being of the community.





Implementation Model

The various activities that will be undertaken as part of the project, over the entire duration are as follows:

- · Recruitment of the project team.
- Establishing the Project Steering Committee.
- Technical training & capability building of the project team and HCWs.
- Community mobilisation campaigns to mobilise the community and conduct monthly awareness sessions.
- Oral Cancer screenings at PHCs, CHCs and camp locations.
- Counseling of suspected cases and referral of all positive cases to Government District Hospitals and Medical Colleges for further diagnostic tests & treatment.
- · Regular follow-ups to ensure progress in the treatment schedule of the beneficiary
- Regular monitoring of the project deliverables
- Bi-monthly Project Steering Committee meetings to ensure the project runs as planned and resolve any issues that may surface
- Impact Evaluation and Reporting of the project upon completion.
