














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Words of Encouragement

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SMSG Ramps Up for the Road Ahead: Training, Strategy & Renewed Momentum in Goa

June marked a month of renewed energy and focus for the Swasth Mahila Swasth Goa (SMSG) initiative. A two-day refresher training camp was conducted to strengthen the capacity of healthcare workers involved in breast cancer screening.

The first day was dedicated to North Goa, where Primary Health Centre (PHC) staff from the district participated. The second day focused on South Goa, engaging PHC teams from that region. The YouWeCan Foundation (YSF) field team was present on both days to ensure smooth on-ground coordination. The sessions were led by technical experts from UE Lifesciences, who revisited key screening fundamentals, addressed field-level technical concerns, and introduced updated protocols shaped by real-world implementation learnings.

These training camps played a vital role in realigning frontline teams and refreshing their technical preparedness as the project gears up to scale in the coming months.







In parallel, an important strategy meeting was held between YSF and the Directorate of Health Services (DHS), Goa, to recalibrate the project's implementation roadmap.

With multiple screening camps cancelled in May due to severe weather conditions and red alerts across the state, the review came at a critical time. Discussions focused on accelerating outreach and strengthening planning mechanisms to ensure the project stays on track to meet its screening target by December 2025.

With a more resilient plan and an even betterprepared field force, SMSG moves ahead with renewed commitment to building a healthier, breast cancer-aware Goa.

Just Keep Swimming: My Journey from Cancer to Self-Love

Life is unpredictable. At 13, I was thrown into the deep end diagnosed with cancer. My mother said something that stuck with me: "Just keep swimming."

So I did. I battled pain, anxiety, and the loss of my identity. Over the next few years, I pieced myself back together. I found strength in fitness, purpose in baking, and eventually launched Oraya's Oven, my own cloud kitchen. Life felt full again—love, friendships, travel, I was thriving.

Then at 25, cancer returned. This time, I swam harder. I promised not to let it break me again. I completed my treatment, came out cancer-free, and was ready to rebuild again. But life wasn't done testing me.

My five-year relationship fell apart. I was recovering from surgeries, a broken heart, and had to shut down my business. When people asked, "How are you?" I'd say "I'm good" while feeling completely lost.

I captured that feeling in a poem: "I'm grieving the life I had, excited for the one that awaits me, But it is scary. I am scared."

Today, I write. I self-published my first poetry book, The Audacious Lover. I work in healthcare, using my journey to support others navigating the system. I'm dancing with life again.

What I've learned is this: The love I gave to others, I deserved to give to myself too. This journey has been about survival, yes—but more importantly, about self-love.

And through it all, I've kept swimming.

Swasth Mahila Swasth Bharat: Where Early Detection Meets Local Action In collaboration with Xiaomi India

Through the Swasth Mahila Swasth Bharat initiative, YouWeCan with the unwavering support of Xiaomi India is delivering a nationwide movement that empowers women with awareness, screening access, and the life-saving power of early detection.

Here's how we've made a difference across 15 districts in 15 states, screening 1,39,986 women and identifying 2,076 suspect cases for further diagnosis and care

- Udham Singh Nagar, Uttarakhand: In the foothills of Uttarakhand, awareness travelled fast. With the help of ASHAs and local champions, 10,000 women were screened, and a significant 290 cases were referred for further care the highest among all districts.
- Baran, Rajasthan: Baran, with its rich heritage, became a site of modern health action. Through robust community involvement, we screened 10,000 women and found 42 who needed timely follow-up.
- Virudhunagar, Tamil Nadu: With deep-rooted cultural pride and community participation, 10,000 women were screened in Virudhunagar, and 81 were identified for further diagnosis. Awareness camps here were met with strong family support and turnout.
- Nuh, Haryana: In a region often underserved by healthcare, Nuh stood tall with 10,000 screenings and 105 suspect cases. The trust built with local families helped turn awareness into action, one household at a time.
- Wayanad, Kerala: Amidst serene hills and scattered hamlets, 7,834 screenings were completed in Wayanad, with 219 suspect cases identified. Women here chose awareness over fear, one village at a time.







- Moga, Punjab: In the heartland of courage and culture, Moga's women turned up in strength and solidarity. Through local mobilisation, we screened 10,000 women, identifying 113 who now have a fighting chance thanks to early detection. awareness into early action.
- Osmanabad, Maharashtra: In a region touched by both tradition and transformation, Osmanabad witnessed 9,974 screenings and 107 suspect cases. The campaign was strengthened by village-level advocacy and frontline engagement.
- Dahod, Gujarat: Among tribal belts and rural clusters, the women of Dahod came forward with quiet determination. 10,000 were screened, and 16 suspect cases were flagged, showing how even the most remote corners can lead the way.
- Barpeta, Assam: In Assam's lush green Barpeta, the campaign reached 9,929 women, and 43 cases were found. With the help of local language IEC and trusted volunteers, the community engaged wholeheartedly.
- Visakhapatnam, Andhra Pradesh: From fishing communities to urban edges, 7,334 women in Vizag were screened, with 128 suspect cases. Coastal awareness turned into early action.
- Guna, Madhya Pradesh: In the central plains of India, Guna embraced this mission with heart.
 10,000 women were screened, and 23 cases were identified, each a reminder of why early detection matters.
- Bahraich, Uttar Pradesh: Despite logistical and terrain challenges, 8,453 women in Bahraich came forward and 116 suspect cases were identified. The outreach here showcased resilience and deeprooted trust in local health workers.
- Kalaburagi, Karnataka: In the Deccan's historical heart, 6,891 women were screened and 299 were found to need follow-up. Kalaburagi's commitment to women's health stood out, despite rural challenges.









- Khammam, Telangana: Khammam responded with incredible enthusiasm — 10,000 screenings and 173 cases identified. From tribal pockets to town centres, women came forward with hope.
- Nadia, West Bengal: Nadia led with awareness and numbers — 9,571 women were screened, and 321 required further care. The response here showed how deeply community health workers can impact behaviour.

Together with Xiaomi India, we've proven that awareness at the grassroots, backed by access and empathy, can change the future of cancer care for women in India.

This is not the end — it's a milestone in a journey powered by purpose and people.


