Expert Talk on Childhood Cancer by Mr. Ankeet Dave

Accesslife, with centers in Mumbai, Pune, and Chandigarh, provides crucial support to children and families battling cancer.

Mr. Dave shared his personal journey, detailing his transition from a corporate career to establishing Accesslife. He emphasized the emotional and logistical challenges faced by families dealing with childhood cancer, stressing the need for holistic support beyond medical treatment.

His talk centered on the power of empathy, urging students to understand and connect with the struggles of others. He discussed the difficulties of running an NGO, including fundraising, resource management, and maintaining emotional resilience. He spoke candidly about the emotional toll, but also the immense fulfillment derived from making a tangible difference in the lives of vulnerable children. Mr. Dave's narrative served as a powerful reminder of the potential for individuals to create meaningful change through compassionate action.









Swasth Mahila Swasth Bharat: A Nation United for Women's Health

The 'Swasth Mahila Swasth Bharat' (SMSB) initiative, launched by the Yuvraj Singh Foundation's YouWeCan in collaboration with Xiaomi India, has been instrumental in advancing breast cancer awareness and early detection across various districts in India. This initiative employs innovative, low-cost technology to provide accessible breast cancer screening, aiming to reach 150,000 women.

- Udham Singh Nagar, Uttarakhand: This district has seen significant outreach, with over 6,600 women screened and 172 suspected cases identified. The initiative's collaboration with local health authorities ensures that the screening process is streamlined and that follow-up care is readily available.
- Baran, Rajasthan: In Baran, the initiative has reached over 5,200 women, detecting 40 potential cases. The program's integration with local health services ensures that suspected cases receive timely follow-ups and necessary medical interventions.
- Khammam, Telangana: In Khammam, over 8,000 women have been screened, resulting in 166 suspected cases and one confirmed case. The initiative's comprehensive approach ensures that women receive continuous support from screening to diagnosis and treatment.
- Virudhunagar, Tamil Nadu: In Virudhunagar, more than 5,400 women have been screened, identifying 41 suspected cases. The program's focus on community education has been pivotal in encouraging women to participate in screenings and prioritize their health.
- Nuh, Haryana: In Nuh, the SMSB initiative has screened over 3,500 women, identifying 93 potential cases. The deployment of iBreastExam devices has facilitated painless and radiation-free screenings, encouraging more women to participate without fear or discomfort.







- Wayanad, Kerala: Wayanad's efforts include screenings of over 5,000 women, with 108 suspected cases and two confirmed cases. The initiative's integration with local healthcare systems ensures that women receive comprehensive care throughout the screening and treatment process.
- Moga, Punjab: Moga's proactive community engagement has led to the screening of more than 3,300 women, with 87 suspected cases identified. The initiative's emphasis on training local healthcare workers ensures that the screening process is both efficient and culturally sensitive.
- Osmanabad, Maharashtra: Osmanabad's efforts have led to screenings of over 3,200 women, identifying 79 suspected cases. The initiative's integration with local health infrastructure ensures that women receive timely diagnostic services and necessary treatments.
- Dahod, Gujarat: In Dahod, over 2,300 women have been screened, uncovering 7 potential cases. The program's culturally tailored awareness sessions have been pivotal in dispelling myths and encouraging women to participate in screenings.
- Barpeta, Assam: In Barpeta, over 5,100 women have been screened, identifying 36 suspected cases. The initiative's culturally sensitive approach has been vital in reaching women in remote areas, ensuring they have access to essential health services.
- Visakhapatnam, Andhra Pradesh:
 Visakhapatnam's participation includes screenings
 of more than 3,000 women, with 62 suspected
 cases identified. The program's emphasis on
 community involvement has been instrumental in
 encouraging women to prioritize their breast
 health.
- Guna, Madhya Pradesh: Guna's participation includes screenings of more than 1,700 women, with 15 suspected cases identified. The initiative's focus on community education has empowered women to prioritize their health and recognize early signs of breast anomalies.







- Bahraich, Uttar Pradesh: In Bahraich, more than 1,400 women have been screened, with 74 suspected cases detected. The program's efforts in this district have been crucial in raising awareness about breast health in traditionally underserved communities.
- Nadia, West Bengal: Nadia has seen screenings of more than 3,700 women, with 170 suspected cases detected. The program's collaboration with local health workers has facilitated seamless follow-up care for those requiring further evaluation.
- Kalaburagi, Karnataka: Kalaburagi has conducted screenings for more than 2,100 women, with 85 potential cases identified. The program's focus on training local healthcare providers has enhanced the quality and reach of breast cancer screenings in the district.

Through these comprehensive efforts, the SMSB initiative is making significant strides in saving lives and fostering a healthier future for women across India.

Myth 3: A healthy diet alone prevents colorectal cancer.


